

## Copyright Notice for Display

## **Copying for private study and non-commercial research**

The making of a copy of any copyright work is an infringement of copyright unless permission has been obtained from the copyright owner or a copyright exception applies.

Copyright exceptions in UK law include making a "fair dealing" copy of a "reasonable" proportion of text, a dramatic work, musical or artistic work, sound recording, film or broadcast for the "purposes of **private study** or **research for a non-commercial purpose**".

You may make a **single copy** of a published literary, artistic, dramatic or musical work for your own personal non-commercial research or private study by means of photocopying or scanning or photography, to the following limits:

- one article from any one issue of a journal or periodical
- one chapter from a published book or extracts from a published book up to a maximum of 5% of the whole of the book
- from a musical work, i.e. sheet music a short excerpt for study purposes but not performance
- from a map or atlas an A4 extract from a map or atlas page.

Multiple copies of the same item may not be made, which means that the copy may not be made available in any network, including in restricted intranets or websites or social media.

All responsibility for ensuring that copyright is not infringed and any infringement of copyright that occurs is borne by the person making the copy and the person (if different) for whom the copy is being made.

For University of Cambridge teaching purposes, you may make and distribute multiple copies of certain published copyright material to registered students and staff under the Copyright Licensing Agency Higher Education Licence (CLA HE Licence).
